

Annnnnnnnnnnnnnnnnnnnnnd.... all the Sci-Fi books!



This definitely helped me to put all the Science in context so I am able to make more sense of it and also answer some difficult questions I sometimes face as a Science Teacher!"

Enid Blyton's Adventure Series - As a young teenager, as soon as I read the first book I knew I had to read all the rest and there were quite a few to get through! Every book had a different adventure full of mystery but what stood out was the friendship of the child detectives which got them through so many seemingly insurmountable obstacles. Every one of the five main characters were different, which made it interesting how they interacted and helped each other face potentially dangerous situations. And they succeeded in all their ventures against the odds, which made it even more fun!

Going even further back in my childhood, I have to mention the Tin Tin comic adventure series as one of my favourite series of books. As a young boy who just moved to England with basic English (some would say no change there!), this book was ideal for it's ease of reading as well as the the brilliant cartoons! I was also fascinated by the different locations in every book with it's related culture and people, which made it seem real and more interesting. The characters were all different like the Enid Blyton's series and they just clicked somehow and managed to solve crimes and other unsavoury mysteries. I loved the comedy moments as well, especially involving Captain Haddock and the incompetent detectives Thompson and Thompson. The faithful dog Snowy was also cute!"

The History of World Book Day:


World Book Day was created by UNESCO on 23rd April 1995 to celebrate books and authors and encourage young people to discover the pleasure of reading.

The first World Book Day in the UK and Ireland took place in 1997 to promote reading for fun. As World Book Day founder, Baroness Gail Rebeck, recalls "We wanted to do something to reposition reading and our message is the same today as it was then – that reading is fun, relevant, accessible, exciting, and has the power to transform lives."

Now World Book Day continues to encourage children and young people to read for pleasure through its work with authors, illustrators, bookshops, and libraries. Thanks to National Book Tokens, book publishers and booksellers, World Book Day, in partnership with schools all over the country, now distributes more than 15 million £1 World Book Day book tokens to children and young people (that is almost one for every child/young person under 18 in the UK and Ireland).





People in today's society like to add sweet dressings to their pancakes, like Nutella, strawberries, lemon drops, sugar and many more.

Ingredients:

Flour: Use all-purpose flour, whole wheat flour, or a combination of the two.

Sugar: Use granulated sugar

Baking Powder: It is the baking powder that makes these pancakes light and fluffy.

Salt: 1/2 teaspoon of fine salt.

Milk: Whole milk, reduced-fat, and even skim milk will work in this recipe.

Melted Butter: You can't beat the taste of butter for this, but if you need a plant-based option, melted coconut oil or melted plant-based butter work too.

One Egg: The egg adds structure, flavor, and fluffiness.

Vanilla Extract: Vanilla adds sweetness and depth of flavor.

Method:

1. Whisk dry ingredients together.
2. Melt butter and warm milk (use the microwave)
3. Whisk wet ingredients together
4. Combine the dry and wet ingredients
5. Cook on a hot buttered skillet

Graduate Prospects:

Almost 80% of recent graduates were in paid work less than 3% were unemployed and looking for work.

Almost all employed graduates were in graduate level jobs, mostly in education, research and development, or health industries.

52% of graduates in paid work for an employer were on a fixed-term contract lasting 12 months or longer, and 42% were employed permanently.

Average annual salary was £41,600.

Almost 89% of graduates agreed their current work was meaningful and that they were utilising what they had learnt in their studies.

COMMIT MYSELF TO GROW CLOSER TO YOU EACH DAY.


