### CHAPLAINCY

Rays of sunshine seemed to permeate the whole of the first term. Bright beams of enthusiasm, kindness, prayerfulness and a feeling of belonging are words that come to mind as I reflect upon the start of the new academic year at St Edmund's.

Our new Year 7 students have been so full of energy and have wanted to achieve as many Spiritual Badges as they can by attending their Retreat and other events. We had two wonderful days where students spent time at St John's Cathedral learning all about the Cathedral and filling in their Cathedral Booklet. They enjoyed their workshops of prayer and activity, a picnic in the park and finished with their Mass, prepared so beautifully by the Year 7 Chaplaincy Team. At the end of Mass, they were presented with their first Spiritual Badge; the excitement was palpable.

Year 7 Chaplaincy Reps were commissioned as well as the Chaplaincy Team. Many students from Year 7 signed up for the Chaplaincy Team. They came together for their time of prayer and workshops and received their Badges. So, now we have a vibrant Year 7 Chaplaincy Team. Chaplaincy is a key element within our school and many thoughts, ideas, charitable works come from these gatherings across the various Year Groups.

This term we have been collecting HARVEST; tins, dried food items and various foods to give to 2 local charities in the city. This has been supported by Chaplaincy, some of the Year 11 students during their Citizenship lessons, our Tutor Groups and staff.

We have 2 lively Saint Vincent De Paul Groups, who meet at lunchtimes every Monday, and are currently making plans for various activities within the school to raise money to provide packs for the homeless through the St Vincent De Paul Society. Both groups were re-commissioned during assembly to work on the school's behalf in this area.

Our Rosary Ambassador Groups have expanded. We now have 3 Rosary prayer Groups who meet at the various breaktimes and lunchtimes on a Tuesday. It is wonderful to see so many of our students praying for the various intentions that are sent to our groups. These intentions come from staff and students. We take time to pray for one another, our school, wider community and the world. Students take turn leading the Rosary. Students were presented with their Rosaries and cards and Rosary Badge and were

commissioned in assemblies to pray on behalf of the school. A truly power house of prayer, reflecting the light of Christ to others.

This continues to flourish as more students want to join to represent the various churches that they attend.

On a Wednesday morning, before school, staff are welcome to come into the Chapel for a Staff Prayer gathering. A time to stop... pray... reflect...and pray for various intentions.

Our Parent Prayer Group resumes on November 6th, at 9 am in the Chapel. A time for parents of students in the school, to come together for a time of prayer and quiet. All are welcome, just contact the Chaplain to register.

Next term we will be preparing for our 2 Masses for our Feast Day of St Edmund. Our students are so enthusiastic to be involved in reading, prayers, altar serving, ushering, offertory, singing and participating in whatever way they can. It is a time to thank God for the blessings that we daily receive within our school community.

Next term we will have our Reconciliation Services for each year group, to prepare us for Advent and Christmas. Students will help to prepare the liturgy and our local priests will be available to provide the opportunity for students to attend Confession.

Fundraising will take place in Tutor Groups to help provide vouchers for various charities within the city. We work together with churches in the city to do this.

Our Carol Service is a highlight for Year 7 as they take time preparing this service and sharing their gifts and talents on a lovely evening in St John's Cathedral. A delightful way to prepare for Christmas.

The Emmanuel Services on the last day include a reflection on the Nativity, singing of Carols as well as our school pantomime. Staff and students enable

such a celebration due to their commitment to rehearsals after school. The celebration is full of and fun, energy and prayer.



Day 3



On our Geography fieldwork we explored the wonders of Portsmouth High Street. Afterwards we ventured to Commercial road and repeated our steps. We checked how many vacant shops there were and how many charity shops then compared them to Gunwharf to answer our hypothesis. Interestingly, we found out that


Gunwharf has 60 high end shops whereas commercial road had as little as 2/3 in comparison. Now in class we are working through the

results, creating graphs and analysing our data. We had a good day and the weather held out! - Harrison 11 Romero











This half-term, Year 7 have been studying a new unit called 'Covenant to Creation'. 
### Year 11 Exam Results

Another amazing year of results from the St Edmund's Psychology Students. Grades at 9-5 were 14% above the national average which reflects the hard work and determination shown by the students who took the exams.

#### Year 11 – Social Influence

The current Year 11 are learning about the impact that people around them have on their behaviour. Students have been discussing whether it is better to be correct by yourself of wrong as part of the crowd, whether it is better to always put yourself first or think of others and whether it is ever ok to not do what you are told by authority.

Students have been working really hard and applying their knowledge to their own lives creating some fantastic examples and discussions. As the year progresses, as a department, we wish them luck with their studies, revision and exams and know that all the hard work they are putting in will benefit them and allow them to achieve their best grades.



The current Year 10's have made a fantastic start to their learning. They have been picking up the key skills they need to complete the course. They have also been extremely focused in lessons learning about how children develop and how we can ensure children have the best opportunities in life. We have been discussing is it best to try everything or only work on what you are good at, whether the way you praise a child impacts their thought process and where do we get our understanding of morals from.

As you can see from the photos students have had a chance to apply their knowledge to studies. Here they were looking at the effect of praise of on motivation and student perceptions of success. They participated incredibly well and produced some interesting results! With the work they are putting in we know they will achieve great success in Psychology.

'Recently Oxford University (specifically Somerville College) came in to talk to a group of high achieving students which I was lucky to be part of. They came in to talk to us and show us the different options and opportunities we can take as we begin to think about our futures and GCSE. They discussed what it was like to go to university and went into depth about the different courses we can take. I learnt there are over 65000 to choose from surprisinaly enough! They told us what we should expect from university, from lectures to sports and social skills even talking about the different financial help we can access. They created an open environment where we where free to ask as many questions as we liked, and get to know whether university was right for us and where we can find extra information. Personally what i took away from the experience was a more open mindset towards university as they cleared up lots of question I had and have allowed me to more openly think of what's right for my education and what path I would like to choose for my future. 



Year 7 were asked to report on how they have settled into the St Edmund's Family since September.


In each addition of the Newsletter, two tutor groups will report on their time at the school so far.


